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PURPOSE:

WHY RECYCLE??

Regular household refuse consists of two main groups. They are recyclable materials and residual refuse, i.e. materials which cannot be reused or recycled and need to be disposed of at the landfill. In Germany, the laws concerning waste disposal have become very strict over the past years and the Army needs to comply with them. A German, for example, produces 92 lbs of refuse per year, while the amount of refuse produced by an American during the same period is 283 lbs. We have to reduce the amount of refuse generated and we can only do that if we separate and recycle our trash every day.

SORTING AT THE WORKPLACE

The SORT Program needs to be implemented at units/office that do administrative work.

HERE ARE A FEW TIPS TO HELP YOU GET STARTED:

Involve managers

Appoint a recycling coordinator.

Assess your situation

*What kind of waste does your office/unit generate?

*What is recyclable?

*Where is a good place to store your recyclables?

*What kind of containers do you use to collect your recyclables?

*How will you get the recyclables to the containers?

Educate staff/ soldiers on how the SORT Program works

The SORT Program needs to include other recyclables besides paper, glass, metals and plastics.

SORTING AT HOME

HOW TO GET STARTED

The participation of every organization, soldier, family member and civilian living and working in our communities is needed to make the SORT Program a success. The following tips will help you to make recycling as easy as possible.

GET ORGANIZED

Find a place to store your recyclables. This could be under the kitchen sink, in a closet or in the garage. Collected plastics and metals can usually be stored in the same container. To store your recyclables you can use paper bags or a cardboard box. Plastic containers are good, too, because they can be used over and over again. Such containers can be purchased at AAFES and on the economy. Get all your family members involved Kids who are old enough to take the trash outside should know about separating and recycling trash. Make sure the size of the containers used for your recyclables is right for you, i.e. the containers are not too heavy and can be easily carried. Remember that your recyclables must be completely empty before you put them into the containers.

FIND RECYCLING CONTAINERS LOCATED IN YOUR AREA:

If you live on-post, in barracks, or in Army family housing, your local DPW, Utilities Branch, has all the information you need. If you live on the economy, ask your landlords and neighbors about the local sorting requirements and whether you need special bags or containers for recycling. Some translations are provided below to help you understand the signs on the containers you will find for recycling.

TIPS FOR REDUCING WASTE

The best way to reduce waste is to avoid it in the first place.

Buy reusable products and avoid disposable goods.

Buy, maintain and repair durable products.

Reuse boxes, containers, paper and other items.

Select products with the least wasteful packaging.

Buy products that can be recycled.

Buy non-hazardous products for the home

Borrow, rent, or share things you don't use very often.

AT HOME

Avoid using paper or Styrofoam dishes. Use washable utensils and dishes for picnics and parties.

Use razors with replaceable blades.

Use cloth napkins instead of paper ones.

Use a sponge instead of paper towels.

Use rechargeable batteries and buy rechargeable appliances when possible.

Buy durable furniture, luggage, sporting goods and tools that will last longer.

Reuse newspaper, packing peanuts and bubble wrap to ship your next packages.
Reuse gift boxes, ribbon, tissue and large pieces of wrapping paper.
Avoid using cleaning products made with toxic chemicals.
Sell or donate leftovers.
Offer unwanted paint, cleaners, etc. to the neighbors
Give old clothing to charities.
Have a yard sale.

AT THE OFFICE

Instead of using disposable cups, take a ceramic mug or glass to work.
Reuse scrap paper. Staple sheets together and make note pads.
Make copies on both sides of the paper.
Share newspapers and professional magazines with co-workers
Re-label old file folders instead of using new ones
Print drafts on the back of scrap paper.
Bring your lunch to work in reusable containers instead of plastic bags.
Use sturdy utensils and dishes for office parties instead of disposables.
Don't stock disposable plates and cups in the office.
Implement waste avoidance and reduction procedures.
Educate a co-worker!

WHEN SHOPPING

Purchase beverages in returnable bottles/cases.
Reuse your paper bags from the commissary.
Use Canvass or mesh string bag when you go shopping.
If you only buy one or two items, don't use a bag.
Avoid buying products with wasteful packaging like bubble wrap, plastic seals and cardboard packaging.
Buy fresh products sold without packaging.
Avoid using plastic bags for only a couple of items.
Ask baggers not to double or triple wrap your purchases.
Buy large or economy size items when available.
Don't buy single serving items.
Buy concentrates for juices, detergents and automobile windshield wiper fluid.
Buy products that are made of recycled materials.

Cardboard or paper soiled with food or liquid are NOT RECYCLABLE.

Don't use plastic bags to store or throw away recyclable paper.

PLEASE TAKE SOME TIME TO FOLD THE BOXES!!

MOVING BOXES AND PACKING MATERIALS

When you receive your household goods, and if they are unpacked by the "Movers", they are obligated to take your carton and crates. If you unpack your household goods yourself, call your Moving Company to pick up your boxes and crates. Call your local transportation office, if you have any questions.

Labels do not have to be removed from bottles. Sort glass by colors: brown, white (clear) and green (blue glass goes in the green containers).

LIGHTWEIGHT METAL AND PLASTIC RECYCLING

WHAT PLASTICS ARE COLLECTED? Many types of plastic packaging are collected, from outside packaging to plastic bottles. All items must be empty. Remove all food, liquid, dirt, or other particles from containers. Only use the collection bags or containers provided by the counties, cities, and/or the Self-Help Store in your area. Check with your stairwell coordinator or landlord. If you are not sure what to do, please call your local DPW, Utilities branch, DSN 348-7117/6658, civ. 06151-69-7117/6658.

Food labels do not have to be removed.

RESIDUAL REFUSE

Any refuse that is not listed as recyclable material has to be disposed of in the household refuse container.

Examples are:

Empty ballpoint/felt-tip pens and markers, cloth/leather remains, audio/video, cassettes, hygiene articles, diapers, rubber products (erasers, bands, etc.), Chalk, cigarette butts/ashes, chewing gum, vacuum cleaner bags, porcelain, aluminum foil, Domestic BBQ pits, Animal feces

Please do not place your full trash bags next to your refuse container; the contractor will NOT pick them up. Trash bags left out in the open like this might not only attract all kinds of pests, but they do not at all contribute to the appearance of our installations and will have a negative impression on visitors. Let's keep the housing areas clean and healthy. Trash bags belong inside the refuse containers.

BIO CONTAINERS

TO ALL SOLDIERS, FAMILIES AND CIVILIANS LIVING OR WORKING WITHIN THE 233rd BSB COMMUNITY USING THE BIO-WASTE PLASTIC CONTAINERS!

HERE ARE SIX (6) PIECES OF GOOD ADVICE FOR THE COLLECTION OF BIOLOGICAL WASTE IN THE SUMMER TIME, SO THAT YOU ARE NOT OFFENDED BY INSECTS AND BAD ODORS FROM THE BIO-WASTE PLASTIC CONTAINERS:

1. PUT THE BIO-WASTE CONTAINERS IN THE SHADE. (WARMTH ENHANCES THE DECAY OF BIOLOGICAL WASTE).
2. PUT SEVERAL LAYERS OF NEWS PAPERS AND/OR A PIECE OF CARDBOARD ON THE BOTTOM OF YOUR EMPTY BIO-WASTE CONTAINER. THIS RETAINS WATER SO THAT THE BIOLOGICAL WASTE CAN' T ROT.
3. ALSO PUT NEWSPAPER OF SUFFICIENT QUANTITY BETWEEN BIOLOGICAL WASTE THAT IS IN THE CONTAINER
4. WRAP YOUR KITCHEN WASTES IN NEWSPAPER OR USE PAPER BAGS (COMMISSARY BAGS).
5. ALWAYS KEEP YOUR BIO-CONTAINER AND COLLECTION BUCKET CLOSED, SO THAT INSECTS CAN'T GAIN ACCESS.
6. ALWAYS LEAVE YOUR BIO-CONTAINER READY FOR COLLECTION (BY THE PICK-UP TRUCK) BY 0700 HRS OF THE RESPECTIVE PICK-UP DAY (FOR DATES, SEE PICK-UP SCHEDULE). ALWAYS PUT THE BIO-CONTAINER OUT FOR COLLECTION EVEN IF IT IS ONLY PARTLY FULL!

WHAT DOES NOT BELONG INTO THE BIO CONTAINERS

WASTE OIL, ALUMINUM FOIL, ASHES, CELLOPHANE, CARBON PAPER, WRAPPING PAPER, FROM BUTCHERS (FREEZER PAPER), FECES, INK RIBBONS, GLASS, CHARCOAL, HYGIENIC ITEMS, e.g. FACIAL TISSUES, COTTON WOOL, NAPKINS, HANDKERCHIEFS
 CAT LITTER ON MINERAL BASE, SWEEPINGS, COSMETICS, LEATHER GOODS, METAL, MINERALS, GYPSUM CHINA, STONES, SAND, SOIL, PAPER: COLORED PRINT AND/OR COATED e.g. BOOKS, CATALOGUES, BROCHURES, MAGAZINES, HIGHLY CONTAMINATED VEGETABLE WASTE, PLASTIC, VACUUM CLEANER BAGS WITH CONTENTS, TEXTILES, DEAD ANIMALS, WAX, DIAPERS, COMPOUND MATERIALS: e.g. CARTONS FOR DRINKS, MILK, etc. AND BAGS FOR COOKIES, CIGARETTE PACKS, CIGARETTE FILTERS AND BUTTS

WHAT BELONGS IN THE BIO CONTAINERS?

FLOWER WASTE, EGG SHELLS, WRAPPING PAPER (NOT COATED), FEATHERS, FISH BONES, GARDEN WASTE: e.g. FLOWERS, PLANTS, LEAVES, STRAW, BRUSHWOOD, BARK, CUT GRASS, PARTS OF HEDGES AND TREES, (DIAMETER SMALLER THAN 10 CM), VEGETABLE WASTE, HAIR, PET LITTER (EXCEPT MINERAL CAT LITTER), UNTREATED WOOD AND WOODEN WASTE (CHIPS OF WOOD, WOOD SHAVINGS, WOOD-WOOL, SAWDUST), COFFEE GROUNDS INCLUDING FILTER PAPER, POTATO PEELINGS

SPOILED), NUT SHELLS, FRUIT SCRAPS (ALSO LEMONS, ORANGES, GRAPEFRUIT, etc.), PAPER: CARDBOARD, NEWSPAPERS OF LIMITED

QUANTITY TO ABSORB MOISTURE, BUT NOT COATED, OR COLORED PRINT, PARCHMENT PAPER, LEFTOVER FOOD (ALSO IF SPOILED), TEA GROUNDS, INCLUDING TEA BAGS AND FILTE PAPER

PLEASE NOTE:

Bulk items will only be picked up during the scheduled pick up dates.

Please see Bulk Trash Pick up schedule.

HOUSEHOLD BATTERIES

Used household dry cell batteries, e.g. for radios, flashlights, cameras, electronics toys, etc., may be brought to the following locations:

1. Self help store – Nathan Hale Depot
2. Commissary – Nathan Hale Depot
3. PX – CFK
4. Commissary – Babenhausen
5. Commissary – A-burg
6. DODD school, B4428 – Lincoln Village

(such as military batteries used in various equipment) must be disposed of via the unit S-4 at DRMO Mainz-Kastel.

POV LEAD ACID BATTERIES:

Used POV batteries may be disposed of at the AAFES Car Care Centers.

Do not just leave them outside; batteries can leak battery acid, which is dangerous to the environment.

WASTE OIL

Tanks for the disposal of any used internal combustion oil, which include both natural and synthetic oil, are located in various motor pools and auto craft shops.

Empty oil containers, used oil/fuel files, smaller than 20 inches and small amounts of used oil/fuel contaminated absorbents must be disposed of in the POL Contaminated Solids container. These containers can be found throughout various maintenance areas.

ANTIFREEZE

Tanks for the disposal of any used anti-freeze are located in various motor pools and auto craft shops. Empty anti-freeze plastic containers should be triple rinsed with water and then water/anti-freeze mixture should be disposed of in the same tanks. The clean plastic containers should be recycled in the plastic recycling yellow bags (where available).

NOTE:

The only authorized areas for performing POV maintenance are at the auto craft shops.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS MATERIAL/WASTE

Household hazardous material/waste should not be thrown away with the regular trash! Household hazardous waste includes the following:

BATHROOM & KITCHEN

Medication

hazardous household cleaners as well as for paint. They may be taken to the 233^D BSB Self-Help Store located at Nathan Hale Depot, Bldg 4132. It is important that these chemicals are in the original container and that this container is in good condition. If you

are in need of any type of cleaner or other chemicals, contact your local Self-Help Store to see if they have anything you can use. These items are **FREE!**

Disposal point for **waste paint, fluorescent light tubes and aerosol cans** is located at the Nathan Hale Depot recycling center. Please call the POC listed above.

Containers for the disposal of **antifreeze/water mixture** are located throughout various maintenance areas and auto craft shops.

Medicine - Expired or unused medicine and over-the-counter or prescription medicine obtained from American facilities may be returned to your local pharmacy. Please call the Medical Clinic for more information.

SAFER & CHEAPER **HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS SUBSTITUTES**

All-purpose cleaner: Mix 1-teaspoon liquid soap, lemon juice or vinegar in 1 qt warm water. Make stronger if desired.

Glass cleaner: Mix 1-teaspoon vinegar or lemon juice in 1 qt. water. Spray on and use newspaper to wipe off.

Drain cleaner: Put 3 teaspoons baking soda in drain, add 1-cup vinegar. Pour a pan of boiling water down drain to clear.

Oven cleaner: Clean spills as soon as oven cools using steel wool and baking soda. ~For tough stains add salt. Do not use on self Cleaning or continuous cleaning ovens.

Toilet bowl cleaner: Use toilet brush and baking soda or vinegar.

Furniture polish: Mix 1 teaspoon lemon oil in 1 pint of mineral oil or vegetable oil.

Laundry detergent: Use 1/3 less detergent when using water softener. Add 1/4-cup vinegar to final rinse.

Rug deodorizer & shampoo: Deodorize dry carpets by sprinkling with baking soda Wait at least 15 minutes and vacuum. Repeat if necessary. **Shampoo:** Mix 1 qt. white vinegar and 3 qts. boiling water. Apply to rug with wet rag, do not saturate rug. Dry thoroughly, and then vacuum.

Roach & ant repellent: Sprinkle baking soda in cabinet edges, around baseboards and cracks.

Flea and tick powder: Put brewer's yeast or garlic in your pet's food. Sprinkle fennel, rosemary or eucalyptus seeds or leaves around sleeping area.

RECYCLING IN LANGEN

Everyone produces garbage: Things that you can't use anymore and want to

throw away. But not everything should or may go into the dustbin/garbage can. Some things are too valuable for the dump or the incinerator. The material from which they are made can be utilized & recycled.

Please check the following list to see how the different materials should be collected.

PAPER - BLUE DUSTBIN/GARBAGE OR PAPER CONTAINER

All clean paper including newspapers, books, forms, magazines and bags belong into the blue dustbin/garbage can. Cardboard boxes with the green dot, "Grüner Punkt" if they are not wax, plastic or otherwise coated belongs here.

GARBAGE - GREY GARBAGE CAN OR CONTAINER

All garbage from the kitchen like fruit or vegetables and things like porcelain, earthenware or pencils that cannot be recycled go in here!

PLASTIC/YELLOW GARBAGE BAG

All food wrapping material from plastic or other materials combines with plastic like bottles; bags and foil belong into yellow dustbin/garbage can. All other wrapping material made from plastic can go here, if they have the green dot "Grüner Punkt".

GLASS & SHEET METAL - METAL COLLECTION CONTAINER

All throwaway bottles and glasses (always without lid) should be color sorted and throw into the glass containers near you. White glass (clear transparent) in one container, brown in one and green/blue glass separately into the green container.

All tins/cans from preserved foods, drinks and similar food as well as aluminum and screw caps are collected in the "Weissblech" container. Spray and laquer tins/cans, containing hairspray or other materials do not belong in this container, but should be delivered to the "Umweltmobil" as special refuse.

2. Items should be put out ONLY on the night before the scheduled date or no later than 0700 hrs on the scheduled date.

3. Failure to follow the above rules may subject the offender to pay for the extra pick up charge.
